Luke 11:11 says, "If a son shall ask bread of any of you that is a father, will he give him a stone? or if he ask a fish, will he for a fish give him a serpent?"

A somewhat infamous story in ancient Scripture tells about a shepherd boy who became king. The Bible describes him as "a man after God's own heart." God works through this man mightily and blesses him greatly. But just as we all do, this king falls into sin and the results are terrible.

The consequence is that his newborn son is going to die. The story is found in the Old Testament book of 2 Samuel. The man's name is David, and after finding out the consequence of his sin, he pleads with God through fasting and prayer that God might save the life of his son.

David comes in the next morning,

and his son is dead.

"Then David arose from the earth, and respond when we washed, and anointed himself, and changed his apparel, and came into the house of the LORD, and worshipped: then he came

> to his own house; and when he reguired, they set bread before him, and he did eat" (2 Samuel 12:20).

I believe this is a clear display of how we ought to respond when God says no to us.

Now, not all issues in our lives are because of our sin, and not all

situations are as serious as life or death, but here are a few ways we can walk through God's no.

Following the example of David, we can:

- 1. Recognize that God is in control.
- 2. Take a shower.
- 3. Get prepared for our next steps.
- 4. Worship God.
- 5. Get some rest.
- 6. Eat some food.

God is the setter of reality, and these are a few steps that we can see from Scripture that will help us walk through the times when God says no.

ECBC's Sunday morning radio show on WPTR 1240 AM and 97.1 FM



hris and Steph Teague met and began falling in love on a 13-hour road trip from Nashville to Philadelphia. They were high school, mission trip sweethearts who later married in college. They were volunteer worship leaders and served together in a variety of ways, and they seemed to be a perfectly normal, happy Christian couple. Their story started to change when Chris entered a season of doubt, which many people walk through on their faith journey. Such seasons are normal and sometimes essential, but Chris believed that, as a leader, he should have it all together. He believed he had nowhere safe to share what was going on in his heart and mind,

and he thought no one would truly understand what he was going through. So, he kept his doubts a secret, and they just kept growing.

At the same time, he was pursuing a degree in the music industry, which offered him plenty of alternative activities to alleviate the shame he felt about the divide that existed between who he pretended to be at church and who he was becoming. Eventually, Chris spent all night out on Saturdays with friends, drinking and partaking in a variety of substances. He woke up on Sunday mornings and led worship to a God he no longer believed in. But no one knew, not even his wife, Stephanie.

The secrecy and the ensuing lies put an insurmountable strain on their young marriage and ultimately lead to their devastating divorce. Stephanie's world was shattered when she learned the truth of what was happening to Chris. She had worked all her life to be a "good, Christian girl." Her lack of control over the situation and her inability to save their marriage left her alone amid the wreckage of their former life, with nothing to do but surrender. Fortunately for her, the place of surrender is where God seems to do His best work.



How did God restore their marriage even after they got divorced?

While Steph discovered what it meant for her to be truly free with Jesus, even after a broken marriage, Chris ran further away into the arms of his captor. Friends, lovers, drugs, and alcohol were his companions. No longer bound by accountability to God, and freed from the shame of having a secret self, Chris openly pursued everything he thought would make him happy and fulfilled. He became ruled by lies, rebellion, and self-seeking. His new relationships were guided by the same selfishness that led him to leave Stephanie.

About seven months after leaving his marriage, the tides shifted, and the consequences of his choices finally came crashing down. His kingdom fell, and all the pleasures and freedoms that had seemed so promising were exposed to him as forgery. Freedom turned to fear,

and reckless abandon was replaced with anxiety. He couldn't hide anymore, but at the same time, in the darkest of moments, he felt immensely isolated.

Then the truth came to him: "A fool says in his heart there is no God." He decided he would settle his doubts later: first he needed a savior. And something truly unbelievable happened. God

asked Chris to pursue Stephanie again.



always knew I wanted to be a mom, but if you had told me I was going to be a pastor's wife I probably would've laughed at you. When Anthony first told me he thought God wanted him to be a pastor, the only response I could think of was, "OK, let's do it."

This is not a shout-out to me. It was the only possible response, because I was terrified of being the reason my husband didn't follow God's plan.

I have grown in so many ways in the past six years, and being a pastor's wife has been such a valuable experience. Growth is a funny thing, though. It almost never happens the way you think it will or when you think it will. A lot of times, growth is happening and you don't even know it. And every once in a while, certain moments of growth stick with you and shape you.

I had one of those moments years ago when my first two children were still babies. Funny enough, the growth occurred during a moment when I was surrounded by ordinary, everyday life—running errands. I was driving between stops and thinking about the craziness of life with kids, and kind of talking to God at the same time. (I find that my quiet times with God often happen in the car.)

I had this almost comical thought: "No wonder why God tells us not to have sex before marriage, because He knows how crazy hard raising kids is, and He knew we would need a partner." I kind of laughed, and I kept thinking: If God had a reason for this "rule," He probably has one for all of His other "rules."

I love to do puzzles. So as I am working through this thought, I think, "So God is the creator of the universe, and everything is like this big puzzle, each piece fitting in its exact spot perfectly to create a beautiful picture. But then sin comes in and wrecks the whole thing."

Now you have all these different pieces everywhere, and God is there saying, "Hey, if you just listen to me I can show you this wonderful amazing picture. I promise I know how the pieces fit together."

But then sometimes (a lot of times), we humans in our sin and arrogance look back at Him and laugh, and we say, "Haha, no, actually I have a way better idea. I know what this is supposed to look like." So then we take one of the pieces, rip it in half, and try to smash it to fit into another piece. We then sit back and wonder why our puzzle looks ridiculous.

As I look back at my original reaction to being a pastor's wife, I think: How silly was I to be afraid, when saying "let's do it" was just another puzzle piece closer to experiencing a wonderful, beautiful, amazing life designed by God.
